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
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Hike Summary

Bath is a beautiful, historic city built from the iconic stone that bears its name. This hike starts in its heart and carries you above and around it, showing it off from every perspective.

BATH SPA STATION

Built in 1840 by Brunel for the GWR. Now a Grade II listed building.



PUMP HOUSE CHIMNEY AND BATH DEEP LOCK

Look out for the ornate chimney beside the Pump House that was built to replenish the water level above Bath Deep Lock.



The city of Bath is magnificent to behold from within, but to take in its full glory stop and admire this view.



SHAM CASTLE FOLLY



Built in 1762 by Ralph Allen to improve the view from his house!



KENNET & AVON CANAL

Covering more than 100 miles, the canal runs between Bristol and Bath, to the Thames at Reading.



WARLEIGH WEIR

Just off the route lies this popular local spot for wild swimming if you are feeling brave!



DUNDAS AQUEDUCT

This remarkable engineering feat, completed in 1810, carries the Canal over the River Avon.

WHEELWRIGHT ARMS

Nestled in the peaceful village of Monkton Combe and surrounded by picturesque hills and valleys.



ST MICHAEL'S CHURCH

This churchyard is the resting place of Harry Patch, the last surviving British soldier to fight in World War I.



FINISH IN BATH

Bath is the only entire city in the UK that has been designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site and it is not difficult to see why.




Here are a few of our favourite bits of wildlife to look out for on this walk:



Great Spotted Woodpecker Very likely to hear them, lucky if you can see them!


Kingfisher
